CELEBRATING OUR EMMANUEL: GOD WITH US, THIS CHRISTMAS SEASON



t the end of September, my family and I were on holiday, and we spent some time in New Plymouth. While visiting we came across this little mountain on the edge of the town called Mount Paritutu. Josiah and Samuel decided that they would like to climb to the top and see the view, so I volunteered to go with them. But there was only one problem, I am terribly afraid of heights! And this mountain was no easy climb. In fact, for the majority of the way it involved pulling ourselves up by a chain, over very steep and rocky terrain.

The two boys took off and were a long way in front of me, to the point where I could not at times see where they were up to. But I kept going, pushing myself as much as I could. At about three-quarters of the way up, I was really struggling and wondering if I was even going to make it to the top when suddenly my two boys (who had already been to the top!!) came down and walked up the rest of the way beside me. Encouraging me with their words and being patient when I had to stop and rest, putting their arm around me and cheering me on. Eventually as they walked beside me step by step, I pushed through my fear, I reached the top and the view was spectacular.

As I stood upon this mountain looking at the spectacular scenery, it struck me that I would not have been able to see this if my boys had not walked with me, especially for that last quarter of the climb, which was the hardest. I really did appreciate their presence with me.

This issue of the Rumblings is the last one for this year and it is the issue where we look towards Christmas and what Christmas means for us. One of the words that we as Christians hear and focus on at Christmas is Emmanuel: God with us. God himself becoming human like us so he can walk with us, in our world. Christmas, is one of the defining things about the Christian faith that differs from all other religions in the world. This is because no other faith makes this claim, that God himself walks in our shoes. God himself became a human baby and grew up to be a man. Emmanuel: God is with us, in the midst of ordinary life.

This baby grew to be a man, who lived, taught, died and rose again, and gives us the Holy Spirit, who is present with us. God's presence with us, in the midst of our lives, means that he is right there, walking with us, encouraging us, nudging us. This is particularly important as we journey through the difficult (we might say rocky) and challenging seasons of life.

Another way that he is present with us, is through his body: his people, our fellow brothers and sisters in Christ, who walk alongside each other and carry each other's burdens. God speaks to us and provides encouragement to us through the people he places in our lives. The people he

works through to bless us. It is often through these people that we know and see his presence with us.

So as you prepare for this Christmas season, think about Jesus our Emmanuel: God with us, and what this means for your life and your faith journey. God's presence is with you through Jesus and he is leading you in your life. Along the way, you may even get to see some spectacular views.

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Christmas Traditions from around Mountainside

With the richness of cultural diversity around Mountainside, I suspected that we had a few different ways of celebrating the birth of our Saviour, so I asked a few people in our church community about how they celebrate Christmas (or how they celebrated Christmas in their childhood):

Marianne Frederiksen (Germany): Marianne spoke about how her family always had an Advent wreath & candles in their home from the beginning of December. Christmas Eve was the main celebration, and the day on which they decorated the Christmas tree and placed a

manger crib underneath. They ate German sausages & potato salad on Christmas Eve and Santa Claus would come, with presents given. On Christmas Day, her family would attend church and then have a big meal for lunch: Stuffed goose or duck, red cabbage, pfefferkuchen (spice biscuits) and Christmas stollen (Christmas fruit cake).



Ane Ongoongo (Tonga): Ane's family in Tonga

cleans & tidies the house inside & out as Christmas approaches. They decorate a Christmas tree & decorate the house with balloons. Extended family gets together on Christmas Eve and stays until New Year. They attend church on Christmas Eve wearing white clothes & special celebratory ta'ovala (woven mat). The service will last about 4 hrs from 6pm and includes the Christmas play by the children. The church gives bags of lollies to the children. This is usually their only gift. On Christmas morning, they wake early and prepare food for a big hangi (earth oven) lunch with the church family after church.

Annette Geese (Denmark): Annette told me that a Danish tradition that her family still follows is to hold hands and dance (or walk) around the Christmas tree singing Christmas carols. They then continue from room to room in order to spread the Christmas spirit through the house.



Ingid Phyn (Estonian Kiwi): Christmas Eve is the focus for Ingrid's family. They have a celebratory

meal & give gifts on Christmas Eve. The meal includes braun (jellied pork). After the meal, they would often attend the 11pm church service. After church on Christmas Day, they would have a meal with the other side of the family.

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Hannah from Tiny Tots (Korean Kiwi): Hannah spoke about how Korea is not a Christian country, so Christmas is not a big celebration there. She attends church on Christmas Day & then has a big (eg BBQ) lunch with her church family because many of them have no other family here in NZ.

Stanley, Mary & Shirley Pidakala (India): Stanley, Mary & Shirley told me how leading up to



Christmas, new clothes would be made for the children (up to 3 sets: for Christmas Eve, Christmas Day & New Year). The Christmas tree is decorated from the start of Advent; the room is decorated with crepe paper ribbons. A paper star with a light inside is put up outside the house. From 19-23 Dec, the youth go from home to home singing Christmas carols until 4-6am. The women start cooking 3 days before Christmas, making sweet & savoury snacks & rose cakes (pictured). 15-20+ platters of these would be made up for the children to distribute on Christmas Day to their (often Hindu) neighbours to spread Christmas joy.

On Christmas Eve they attend a late service (10:30pm -2am) in which the children perform the

Christmas play. Often Hindus will also attend this Christmas 'festival', so it is an opportunity to present the gospel. There is 8:30am church on Christmas morning after which the platters are distributed while the women cook a big feast: biryani & 2 curries (lamb & chicken), to which non-Christian friends are usually invited.



Abby Abera (Ethiopia): Abby explained to me

that as an Orthodox country using the Julian calendar, Ethiopia celebrates Christmas on Jan 7 instead of Dec 25. They start with a midnight church service on Jan 6, with everyone holding a special Christmas candle and singing Christmas carols. The family celebrate together & wear their best clothes. After another church service on Christmas morning, the family has a big feast, cooking lamb or chicken (depending on their means). After lunch, the children play Christmas games. Abby told me that it is not Ethiopian tradition to give gifts or have a Christmas tree, but because her father studied in the USA, her family had a Christmas tree, decorated with chains of lollies, tinsel & handmade decorations; and they were given 1 gift each.

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Felix Tong (Hong Kong): Felix said that in the lead up to Christmas, people from his church family walk up the hill to their church, singing carols to residents of the high-rise apartments they pass, & then have late night dessert together. There are 2-3 church services held over Christmas, often including joint services with other Lutheran churches. Baptisms are traditionally held on Christmas Day & there is Holy Communion at every service.

Linda Heidrich (Austrian Kiwi): Linda remembers as a child that during the war years the Christmas story was the core of Christmas, but that in terms of food and gifts, they made do


with whatever they had. The children would learn Christmas poems or songs and recite them. Christmas Eve is the most important day for Linda's family, giving small gifts to each other. They have a Christmas tree, with a nativity scene nearby; and she hangs a large Christmas star in the hallway. They share a special meal either on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day.

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New and Renewing Churches Update

When I was still in Australia, just after I decided to accept the call to come to Mountainside, I was contacted by Dean Eaton from Local Mission Department of the LCA. I met with him and he shared with me that Mountainside had been identified as a 'sending church' and had received some support and visits from him under the New and Renewing Churches program. At the time of this conversation, Mountainside had put things on hold because of the Reformation 500 involvement. The Board for Local Mission, however, was still keen to make contact with Mountainside in 2018 once I had settled in here, in order to discuss where Mountainside was in this journey and where it might lead.

A few people have been asking me lately about where we are up to with the 'Sending Church' ministry. So I would like to take the opportunity to inform you about things that are happening.

In April this year, Noel Due from the Department of Local Mission came to visit us. He met with myself, William, Bishop Mark, and also with Mountainside Parish Council members the next day and then preached for us on Sunday.

Noel came to discuss where we were at regarding Mountainside being a 'Sending Church' and the possibility of Church Planting. As a part of the discussions with Noel, it became clear that God is doing something bigger in us and in the wider Church than perhaps we realised. At the time, Pastor William had only recently started his call with us here at Mountainside, in which things for us were changing. No longer did we have a separate Chinese based ministry using our building, but this ministry was now under Mountainside. So we are no longer two separate churches but are one church with two services. It was then highlighted that two other congregations and their pastors, had similar contexts to what we at Mountainside have.. Pastor Mark Schultz (Epping, NSW), and Pastor Matthew Huckel (Pasedena, SA). All three congregations are working with multicultural congregations, with multicultural staff, as one church body. This is something that had occurred only recently in all three congregations. As a result of Noel's visit, the three congregations (including Mountainside) applied to the Local Board for Mission, and the LCA individual districts, and put forward a proposal to start a network between all three lead pastors and congregations. This was approved and funding has been granted by the LCNZ (for Mountainside) and the Local Board for Mission.

What this means is the following:

Noel Due has agreed to be a pastoral mentor to me. We have spoken via Skype every month for the last 5 months.

A network meeting using Skype, facilitated by Noel Due has begun between the lead pastors. One other pastor, Wayne Muschamp, from GlenWaverly, in Melbourne has also joined this network. We have met via Skype twice already, and are planning to increase this to once a month.

We have been granted funding to visit each other's congregations and to do some professional development together specifically focusing on multicultural ministry and mission. This funding covers not only the lead pastors, but also the other key pastoral staff working in this area, and also one other person. So the invitation is to myself, Pastor William and one other. The first one of these will be with Pastor Mark Schultz in February next year (we will inform you when everything is confirmed).

Being a part of this network has also had some benefits to us at Mountainside that we are hopeful will provide some fruit:

- We have been identified as a key church by the Local Board for Mission in the LCA. We are on their radar, so to speak.
- The network has been discussing ways of applying for further funding, which if successful, Mountainside would also benefit from.
- The network has been sharing resources and experiences with each other that will become invaluable going forward.

In sharing the journey so far with you all, I pray that this encourages you all to see that God is at work among us. He is working in ways that are perhaps unexpected, but will bring about his purpose for us as his body, even if it has taken a different direction than initially planned.

Please continue to pray for all of us here at Mountainside. Particularly for our leadership as we journey together with the LCA/LCNZ and as we seek God's will and direction for the future of our church (both Mountainside, and the wider Church).
